#### 1. ASA "FIRE" SHOW & CALGARY STAMPEDE ART AUCTION

**Ray Swirsky** is showing his work *Inferno* at the Alberta Society of Artists' juried exhibition "Fire", which moved from Edmonton to Calgary this year (Southern Jubilee Auditorium), and is on until May 19. Ray also has paintings entitled *Bow Valley Fire Sky* and *Serenity* featured at the very popular 36th Annual Calgary Stampede Art Auction. Artwork is on display at Western Showcase's Art Gallery (BMO Centre, Stampede Park) beginning July 6 with a live auction July 13.

#### 2. US MEDICAL SCHOOL CHOOSES ARTWORK AS SPECIAL AWARD

**Valerie Gobeil's** artwork, *Medical School*, was commissioned by a naturopathic medical school in the US to be the prize awarded to a top student. The 18" x 24" oil on canvas will be awarded to the graduating student voted Most Outstanding Classmate, Class of 2017 who is considered to be "the most empathetic with patients, and most supportive of classmates." The award ceremony will take place in June at the College of Naturopathic Medicine in Tempe, Arizona. After receiving this artwork, the college decided to commission Gobeil again to paint a very large piece depicting the history and philosophy of medicine to be placed in the college's entrance.

#### 3. JURIED ONLINE ART COMPETITIONS

**Kathy Hildebrandt, AFCA** has had her work accepted into three international online exhibitions. She participated in the Society of Canadian Artists' Open International Online Juried Exhibition (featured until June 15), International Society of Acrylic Painters' 8th Annual ISAP Open Online Show, and the Richeson75 Still Life & Floral International Art Competition. Her pastel entitled *Bad Boys, Bad Boys, Whatcha Gonna Do* received Third Place in the SCA's exhibition. All of these shows' artwork is available for viewing online indefinitely.

#### 4. JEWISH FRIENDSHIP FESTIVAL ART SHOW

**Monica Gewurz**'s diptych entitled *Friendship Shawl* was accepted for the Sidney & Gertrude & Zack Gallery's juried Festival Ha'Rikud Group Show. It takes place within the 14 Annual Ha'Rikud Festival in Vancouver, which is themed Friendship this year in celebration of Jewish and Israeli culture. Opening reception May 4, 7-9 p.m. Exhibit continues to May 22.

#### 5. 18TH ANNUAL LOOK SHOW BEST IN DRAWING

At the 18th Annual Look Show, hosted by the Community Arts Council of Greater Victoria, the pastel artwork entitled *Duet* by **Pancrasio "Pan" Tan, AFCA**, won Best in Drawing. The community arts exhibition staged at The Bay Centre, Victoria, from March - April, 2017, showcased over 450 artworks and installations including Pan's 19.5" x 19.5" pastel.

#### 6. CSPWC ANNUAL JURIED EXHIBITION

**Rex Beanland**'s watercolour painting *In The Pit: The Conversation* was juried into "Water Reflections," a national show sponsored by the Canadian Society Of Painters in Water Colour. The show will be held at the Santa Fe Gallery in Owen Sound, Ontario, until May 26. Rex's painting *Early Morning, Welcome To Calgary* was also juried into the 2017 Calgary Stampede's Art Auction, previewing July 6-13, BMO Centre, Stampede Park.

# HOW DOES THE GALLERY SELL YOUR ARTWORK?

#### DID YOU KNOW?

Art sales have increased substantially within the FCA Gallery.

This article gives you some insight into the successful strategies we have implemented in the gallery in last two years that have contributed to the increased sales.

### NEW FCA GALLERY INITIATIVES

#### PATRON INQUIRY FORMS

Patron Inquiry forms are a simple paper method to help track potential leads. Staff can share up to date information about the progress on current leads so if the person who received the lead initially is not in the gallery, another can pick up where they left off. Any potential client who completes the form is added to FCA's database to receive pre-sale emails.

#### TRACKING CLIENT PREFERENCE

Now clients and potential clients are added to our database, giving staff quick access to client sales history and detailed preferences such as:

- 1. Specific artists' the client has expressed interest in
- 2. Their sales history, the names of the artists' they've purchased work from
- 3. Artists' styles they admire, but have not yet purchased

This information helps the FCA to create targeted sales emails. For example, if clients have purchased artworks by an artist in the past, an email is sent announcing that the same artist has an art piece in the upcoming exhibition, providing a "sneak peak" and early opportunity to purchase.

#### STANDARDIZED PURCHASE WRAPPING

All artworks being delivered or collected by hand are given the same outer wrapping treatment. Each artwork is wrapped with a thank-you card explaining a brief history of the Federation, our website address and how the purchase has supported a non-profit charity. Each artwork is also wrapped with my business card, should they have further inquiries or wish to purchase again. For consistency, all artwork collected in person by the client



is wrapped in brown paper, tied with simple string and finished with an FCA gold seal.

This attention to detail makes the FCA stand out amongst our competitors. The intention is that when people see this style of wrapping, simple though it is, they will come to associate it with the Federation.

#### EMAIL LEADS AND SALES FOLLOW-UPS

Although follow-ups are labour intensive, they are vital to closing sales and creating a pleasant and professional client culture. Many artists and visitors have the impression that artwork "sells itself." This is rarely the case. Staff will often be required to follow up with an interested potential client three to five times to close a sale through a variety of "touch" methods including phone calls, encouraging repeat visits from that client to the gallery, correspondence with the artist and marketing emails.

Whenever a same-day sale cannot be closed, FCA staff follows up with the potential client the same day through a personalized email. This email includes a photo of the piece that attracted interest, further information about it, a short biography of the artist and direct link to that artist's website.

These emails are visually appealing, consistent and have often resulted in a phone call to ask about purchasing the piece. If we can close the sale at this point, we do. This is followed by a "thank you" email. If we don't get a reply, additional emails are sent when the exhibition is due to close to remind the client that these artworks are soon leaving the gallery.

"Thank you" emails were inspired by good, old-fashioned customer service and just common sense. For every sale we make, the client receives a personalized email, thanking them for the purchase, and giving more information about the artist and a link to their website, if they have not received this information already. Many galleries and artists think the sale ends at the handshake. However, we've seen from experience that continuing a genuine relationship with clients after the sale brings them back. They know that at the Federation, they'll not only find high quality art, but also a level of customer service that isn't found elsewhere.

#### CLIENT PRE-SALE EMAILS

Emails are sent to our database of clients prior to the online and ingallery launch of exhibitions. Anyone who has purchased or voiced in-*(Continued p.9)*

terest in FCA Gallery artists receives this email and is given the first opportunity to view and purchase before exhibitions open to the public. These emails discuss upcoming exhibition dates, opening and/or artist receptions and offer an exclusive online preview of the exhibition before anyone else. Currently 458 clients subscribe to this list.

#### SMALL ARTWORK DISPLAYS

We replaced a magazine stand that formerly held small original plastic-wrapped artworks, with a display specifically for these artworks to enable visitors to browse freely and encourage them to actually pick up the artwork. We still encountered a problem though, with potential clients thinking these works were prints and that the \$150 - \$200 price tag was steep for a print. We resolved this issue simply by labelling each artwork with an "Original Artwork" sticker. As a result, we regularly see close to \$1,000 in sales per month from these displays alone.

David Langevin, Dark Winter Storm

#### WORKSHOP

David Langevin traveled North to add sparkle to our spring thaw and Mud Season. His threeday workshop at the Dawson Creek Art Gallery enticed 20 participants, some joining him for a third time! Here, David covered his canvases with numerous, thoughtfully-placed layers of glazes, veils and tints. He explained that the layers create multiple shades of colour without having to mix paints on a palette. These layers play with light similar to the works of Old Masters who used multiple layers of oil paint to attain a plethora of hues and luminosity. Participants fashioned an evergreen tree and then Aspen trees using glazes, veils and tints. Intermittently, David demonstrated the process involved in the creation of his "tree portraits" using acrylic mediums to lift the tree from the substrate before applying colour.

#### WORKSHOPS/DEMONSTRATIONS

In March, Juve Furtado, AFCA and Doug Wasilieff presented a demonstration on Photographing Artwork. After both artists discussed their preferences for natural or artificial lighting to take photographs of their work, they explained how to prepare photos by editing/ resizing in JPEG format using Elements 11 and programs available for free from the internet. These standards are required for FCA shows (and other submission applications). In April, Pennylane Shen's workshop "Navigating the Art Industry: Professional Practice for Emerging Artists" offered these insights: 1. Keep your message clear. Don't promote yourself as anything but an artist (such as a gardener) in blogs/website/facebook. 2. When presenting work to galleries, never "drop in" with your art. Approach via email with 2-3 images, and don't follow up more than once.

In March's Demonstration, **John Pryce** discussed some of the choices of grounds and textures of linen and canvas on a basic transparent and opaque block-in on a 16" x 20" acrylic primed panel. John, who was recently awarded AFCA status, also had a successful career as an international architectural illustrator. His loose, eloquent technique is the result of years of experience in drawing, colour and composition.

Sandhu Singh's Watercolour Demonstration in February revealed his fast watercolour style to portray busy street scenes, seascapes and landscapes with haze and mist. He fearlessly approaches his subject with looseness to portray its movement. Although watercolour is unforgiving and complex, there is softness in his work that creates a powerful, understated mood. Sandhu believes that composition is the most important aspect of painting; he captures the essence of the subject using strong tonal values along with bright colours to achieve balance.

### MIKE SVOB: REDEFINING THE VALUE OF COLOUR

#### By Carol Crenna

Mike Svob, SFCA, has been a full-time artist for 35 years. He has had over 70 exhibitions and produced 25 large-scale murals throughout North America, with paintings held in private collections globally. Art Avenue speaks to the Impressionist (and former FCA president) known for his signature bold colour.

#### AA: What gave you confidence to become a full-time artist?

**MIKE:** In the 70s, when there were very few professional artists in Canada, my father-in-law lost his job and became a full-time painter. Despite being in his 50s, he became a great success and made me realize it was possible.

#### **AA:** Why did you join the FCA?

**MIKE:** After higher education, I wanted to become a full-time practicing artist and meet people who made a living as practicing artists (not art teachers). I found the FCA in 1981—the only place I know where you can network with a diverse group of painters who share the same goals. At that time, Allan Edwards, Brian Johnson, George Bates, Brian Travers-Smith and Robert Genn became friends and influenced me. I took classes from many members including Kiff Holland and Alan Wylie. The most important lesson I learned was that to do well, you have to devote yourself to painting full-time, not just talk about it. A painter needs to paint. A lot.

### **AA:** Do you mean in order to become good at it, or because you won't make a living if you don't?

**MIKE:** The latter. The harder you work at it, the "luckier" you get, the more "talented" you become, the more "connections" you find—all reasons artists use to conclude why another person is doing better than they are. However, in my experience, making connections doesn't make an art career. You can and must find your own audience for your own art. I tried street corners, church basements, bazaars, outdoor fairs, hotel lobbies, restaurant walls...

#### **AA:** Why do you work in oil, acrylic and watercolour instead of focusing on one?

**MIKE:** Being a practicing artist means that you never "arrive," you always strive to learn more, to get better. If you feel you've exhausted the potential of one medium, start another. A new medium forces you to think and react differently; you must reinterpret and relearn. Some of what's learned in the second medium can be transferred to the first. As a result, you discover unique ways of communicating through your art. This keeps it interesting.

**AA:** Don't you worry about people wanting to buy a "signature Svob"? **MIKE:** No. I have changed my style many times because I get bored. I paint the painting and then hope that I will find someone to buy it. I have been lucky in this regard.

#### AA: You aim to complete paintings in one day. Why?

**MIKE:** Since I keep most ideas in my head only, I get better results if I complete them in one day. By focusing on it from beginning to end, shapes, values, colours, edges stay firmly in my mind. Unlike people that plan work in stages or processes, if I leave it for a few hours, when I return it's like I am starting over. I am currently working on a 3' x 7' painting that I can't complete in a day. So I create a sketch, draw it on the canvas and use a grid to get the right proportions and shapes in the right place. But each time I come back to it, I say, "So what was I trying to do here?" After spending hours on it today, I might not remember the concept tomorrow, and repaint all the same areas over differently.

#### **AA:** When is your painting done?

**MIKE:** I don't feel that a painting can ever be done. It can always be better. If it's overworked, that just means you have to repaint that area over again.

#### **AA:** Do you have a consistent technique?

**MIKE:** The only part of the practice that remains consistent is that I work big to small: big idea to small, big shape/pattern to small.

### **AA:** You are known for strong colours. How do you have the confidence to push the colour when working plein air?

**MIKE:** I try to capture what I see, but if I don't like the colour, I will capture the shape, pattern or lighting, and do what I like with colour. Artists commonly add white to a colour to lighten it, making the painting cold, chalky and dead. This is not as visually interesting as using the transparency of paint layers. When teaching, I sometimes take students' white paint away.

### **AA:** How do you create realism with brights?

**MIKE:** It is about value. When a good musician plays their instrument, they use its full range. The most important way to use paint's full potential is with value, not colour. If you don't employ the full range of tones, paintings become flat, lacking depth and brilliance. Don't just paint red, paint a tonal range from pinks to crimsons. To begin, I initially plan my dark, mid-tone and light values in large shapes of sky, mountains, trees, but I don't consider colour.

**AA:** *How do you decide that a mountain is going to be purple and orange?* **MIKE:** I pick colours I like. If you want the object to look like a particular mountain or person, you can play endlessly with different colours, but you cannot fiddle much with value and shape.

#### AA: Do you prefer certain colours?

**MIKE:** It is human nature to prefer warm tones. When I moved to BC, I started painting the environment's cool greys, blues and greens, but they looked depressing. I paint with warm colours because I enjoy seeing them.

#### AA: You will be teaching at the FCA Plein Air Retreat.

**MIKE:** Sometimes it is easier to teach for money than to sell artwork! Yet, when you finally make enough money selling art, you often teach far less, and spend much more time by yourself in the studio or at art shows where most people tell you your work is fabulous. Without teaching and interacting with new eager and talented artists, you can lose your enthusiasm and become jaded. You forget it's fun!

**AA:** You had your own single engine airplane that you flew to remote areas to go trekking. Now that's plein air!

**MIKE:** Right now, I am painting mountains inspired by a month hiking in the Rockies last summer. I am in love with what I see in the outdoor world. Being able to spend my life interpreting that through my art is a great privilege.

# ART IN THE LIFE OF... CATHERINE SHEPPARD'S PASTEL PARROT

I am absolutely amazed at the diversity of brightly coloured birds that there are in our world. I challenge myself to capture their natural beauty through my art. My husband and I travel to wildlife parks, zoos and conservatories in search of these feathered creatures.

While visiting the Point Defiance Zoo & Aquarium in Tacoma, Washington, we spotted this brilliantly coloured Military Macaw. It is one of the larger parrots found in the forests of Mexico and South America. I photographed this rare parrot with my Nikon D300 camera that gives me the fine detail I need to characterize my art in a true-to-life manner.

I took 25 shots while he was preening himself. When I reviewed the photos, I quickly knew which one would make an interesting piece; I look for something unexpected that would be intriguing to capture in pastels. I want the myriad vibrant colours and textures to excite the senses of the viewer, and express the feelings that I had when I first set eyes on this magnificent bird.

I chose a Sennelier sanded art board as a base because it works well to hold the many layers of pastel needed to recreate the multitude of feathers. Soft pastel is very near to pure pigment with very little binder to hold it together. This is why the colours are so brilliant and last for a surprisingly long time.

I start with a sketch with a white charcoal pencil. I position the bird on the art board in a spot that creates balance and also offers visual appeal. I work from top to bottom and from left to right to avoid smudging. Sometimes I will turn a piece upside down, keeping the board clean, but also making sure my orientation remains correct.

I work the feathers in sections, which look like an abstract piece of art at first. I start with Prismacolor NuPastel Colour Sticks that are a hard pastel, and then build up with softer Unison or Rembrandt pastels for that rich colour that gives a velvety

appearance. This is further enhanced by rubbing the colours into the sanded paper with my fingers, varying the pressure as I go, to produce just the right look. A fair amount of blending is required to create the seamlessness from one feather to another.

While working on a section, I finish off with Stabilo Carbothello Pastel Pencils that are sharpened to a fine point to render the fine detail in each feather using diagonal strokes. With pastels, I can achieve the unbelievable hues, and control the softness while bringing out the textures of individual feathers. While colouring the feathers, I realize just how diverse they actually are in this beautiful bird. I aptly titled the art piece "A Vibration of Colour."
