

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DIRECTOR'S COMMUNIQUÉ



For me, early January is busy with planning for the coming year and rounding up the previous year. Through the first couple of weeks, the final numbers and surveys will roll in and I'll try to form a coherent picture of 2019. I do this because I have a Board of Directors and about 2,750 members to report to, but I also use the analysis as a planning tool. I can't decide how to move forward

unless I have a clear idea of where we've been.

I already have the final information on some projects such as the Plein Air Retreat. Last year, we'd hosted the retreat at the Bamfield Marine Sciences Centre, a spectacular facility with spectacular vistas. It was a great success with 95% of participants wanting to return to do it all again. Registration for last year's September retreat was full by April so I advise anyone who wants to attend this year's retreat, a return to Flying U Ranch, to register soon.

We're also steaming ahead on bringing services to our members across Canada. In 2018, we started a new chapter in Prince George, BC. In 2019, we announced a new chapter in Toronto, ON, and for 2020 we're hoping to start a new chapter in Edmonton, AB. Organizing these is done by local artists while Federation staff takes an active role in supporting FCA members to found their local chapters. A new fully-revised Chapter Handbook is available as is a template set of bylaws and policies (thanks in large part to our members of the new Toronto chapter!) If you live in an area without a chapter, you too may want to get involved in forming one.

We've already established two things for 2020. The Foundations Program, which has been very popular since its inception in 2017, will be online for all artists across Canada to participate in. Check the

"Education" section of our website for details and registration. We're also reintroducing sculpture, after a 25 year hiatus. Following the past year and a half of experimentation, 2020 will be the year when sculptors may join the Federation and participate in exhibitions. We'll post more information as we move ahead. So, if you are interested, please sign up for our eNewsletter and keep yourself in the loop.

The following year, 2021, will bring with it an 80th Anniversary celebration of the Federation. But before we can celebrate our 80th, it is prudent to take note that 2020 is the 100th Anniversary of the Group of Seven. It was May 7, 1920 that the Group first exhibited together. The Federation in particular would like to celebrate this because, of course, many of the Group of Seven went on to be founding members of the Federation of Canadian Artists following the Kingston Conference in 1941.

What bound the group together was a similar vision of Canada, of art, and of the role of art in Canada. "Art must grow and flower in the land before a country will be a real home for its people," stated the original exhibition catalogue text. I am a strong believer in this vision for the role of art in Canada and will do what I can to make visual art flower and grow for our collective futures. I know that the staff, volunteers and Board of Directors all share this vision. I hope you will all join us in this quest.

Note that we've created a call for entries in honour of the Group of Seven. We hope that you will participate by submitting artwork in their style and favourite subject matter for the Group of Seven 100th Anniversary Exhibition.

A FEATURE

ANN WILLSIE: AN **IMPRESSIONIST'S VIEW OUTSIDE THE STUDIO**

Ann Willsie, AFCA, who's been a professional painter for 35 years, has a distinctive Impressionistic style influenced by Van Gogh and her artist mother, and inspired by exploring the country road less travelled. Ann discusses what compels her to paint a specific setting en plein air, and the elements that enable viewers to experience her inspired vision.

AA: Why do you choose oil paint?

ANN: I am a big proponent of oil and encourage others to try it. Nothing compares to its luscious, buttery texture and earthy, natural colours. Oils also make it possible to easily blend your colours right on the canvas rather than premixing. My method of painting is alla prima – wet on wet – which means I continue working on and finish the painting before the paint dries whether it is in one session of a few hours or over two to four days.

AA: Can we "dissect" your lovely In the Shade of the Olive Tree? ANN: I begin with a light Burnt Sienna underpainting, a wash of paint thinned with mineral spirits to cover the white canvas, creating a warm background for my work, and unifying the finished painting. Then with my brush, I roughly sketch in the big shapes to place the general image of what I want to paint on the canvas. Then, I start with the darks to paint in more detail, and build up to the lights; and I work "from lean to fat," from thin washes to pure thick paint. The last thing I paint is the lightest areas, which end up the thickest due to the number of layers of paint used.


I chose to focus on this olive tree that left me awestruck with its squat, twisted trunk and gnarly branches. Abundant throughout the Mediterranean basin, these ancient wonders date back up to 5000 years. They don't grow tall, but the trunks become thick and very knotted and tangled.

AA: How do you create a balance of darks and lights?

ANN: Whether painting en plein air or using a photo, I am looking to find a balance of values as a determining factor before deciding on the subject to paint. I have been studying values more intensely in the past few years to improve my paintings.

AA: It will encourage newer artists to know you still grapple with values; so they don't need to get them perfect before they can make a successful painting!

ANN: It is hard to get values right, and so yes, I'm still working on that after many years. I have learned that it is the values that make the painting, not the colour. You can make a painting any colour you want as long as the values are right. To get them right, compare lights and darks within each object and with other objects surrounding it to make them impact each other.

AA: Do you try to match the colours you see?

ANN: Colours are inspired by a setting, but I personally visualize how the colours should be interpreted when looking at a particular scene. I go with what I feel and what colours I now know work harmoniously together. For example, placing complementary colours beside each other can make those colours really pop. I have also gotten a deeper understanding and appreciation of the greys. I love their softness, and so when looking at my paintings that use greys 3 prirais plus white combo0, the viewer doesn't immediately see "out of the tube" colours of green or red but a muted variation.

AA: Do you always get the colour right?

ANN: It can be trial and error. I had completed an olive tree scene years ago that didn't sell - I was not happy with the background colour as it wasn't harmonious with the rest of the painting. Recently, while mixing colours for another painting, I mixed a pale green shade, and thought I would try it on the background of the olive tree painting, and Bang! It was 100% better. Even though I had thought I'd finished the painting long before, this addition changed it so much, it sold immediately.

AA: In your award-winner Down Memory Lane, you added complementary pink touches throughout the greenish painting.

ANN: Yes. They weren't there in real life, but it helped to pull the painting together and move the viewer's eye around the painting. This is something that has become more intuitive rather than consciously done. You'll also notice that my brushstrokes become softer with blurred edges as you move into the distance whereas the foreground has sharper, more defined edges. This is a key to creating "atmospheric perspective," which is accomplished by reducing the intensity of colour, the edges and the details as you move into the distance. In this painting, the background isn't as important as the play of light and shadows on the road leading back to the focal point, being the end of the lane. And, if the background wasn't painted this way, objects in the distance could appear closer, and therefore move forward. The eye tends to focus on areas with the most contrast. Therefore, one way to create a focal point is to put dark right next to light.

AA: In these paintings, "floating" leaves around trees' edges create a dream-like quality and more movement.

ANN: This is my style of painting — very Impressionistic. I take off my glasses when I paint outside, resulting in me seeing less detail in the scenery, just more shapes and values, which is what I paint! I use "negative space painting" within the mass of the tree branches by putting in small brushstrokes of the background colour and also let light shine though as it would in real life. The background, including sky, is usually the last thing I paint with muted colours that don't compete with the foreground.

AA: Why did you choose to paint this setting?

ANN: This little lane led into a cemetery, but it was the quality and intensity of light at its end, and the trees providing a canopy, casting shadows across the lane, that caught my attention. The darks, the cooler colours in the foreground trees, make the warm lights look brighter and glowing at the end of the path. Every painting must have a variety of values — so a full spectrum of lightest lights and darkest darks need to be consciously added for impact in addition to mid-tones even if you don't see them in the actual scene.

Also, I paint things I am passionate about. Capturing that first Wow! impression, an instant feeling I've gotten when seeing something, is

what I want to portray, not necessarily the subject matter. It's the lines, movement and rhythm that I love in nature.

AA: You're teaching at the FCA Plein Air Retreat at the Flying U Ranch in September. ANN: I strongly believe that painting en plein air will make anyone a better painter. It forces us to get the important information down on the canvas, instead of spending time pondering each brushstroke.

If you only have a few hours to paint an entire scene, you won't fuss with details; you'll focus on the colours, the light direction, general shapes and values that are the important information. As a result, you capture the essence.

The intent of plein air painting is not to paint a masterpiece, simply a chance for growth, exploration, and being in touch with nature. When painting outdoors, you see so much more — far more colours and shadows — than in a photo. Whether your painting succeeds or fails, the experience will contribute to your development as an artist.






