



## 80TH ANNIVERSARY FEATURE: HISTORY & MAKING OF THE FCA

The Federation of Canadian Artists is Canada's largest and second oldest organization dedicated to serving artists, launched in 1941 with a mandate to raise artistic standards through education & promotion. To honour our 80th year in operation, we offer a timeline to disclose (to the best of our knowledge\*) the sequence of events that contributed to the growth of the long-established organization.

#### **FCA TIMELINE**

#### 1941

Artist André Biéler, Director of the National Gallery, Harry McCurry and over 150 professional artists, art critics and educators from across the country met in Kingston, Ontario for an organizational conference titled "The

Kingston Conference," aiming to unify Canadian artists. Ernest Lindner reflected, "Physically, it took us three weeks to recover from the conference; spiritually, we fortunately never quite recovered..." Notable founding members included Group of Seven's Lawren Harris, A.Y. Jackson and Arthur Lismer, and Ernest Lindner (who worked closely with the Group of Seven), in addition to Emily Carr, Jack Shadbolt and Frances Loring.

#### 1942

Biéler, who was in Toronto, became the first president of the Federation of Canadian Artists. In his First Annual Meeting report, Biéler proclaimed, "Let the artist's hand be unbound! Let the emotions of his heart find expression! And let the work of art be shown to all, that our pride may find satisfaction!" The organization was divided into regions, headed by a regional organizer. Original organizers: Gordon Sinclair (Western), Ernest Lindner (Saskatchewan), Byllee Lang (Manitoba), A.Y. Jackson (Ontario), Walter Abell (Maritimes).

#### 1943

Lawren Harris, who had moved west, became the BC representative and next president of the Federation of Canadian Artists; and public promotion of the Federation began. In Walter Abell's publication *Maritime Art* (February–March 1943), Arthur Lismer

stated that the goals of the Federation were to improve understanding of the role of artists in society, to encourage youth while supporting established artists, and to bring art to the community." WWII was still raging in Europe. Under the heading of "War and the Artist," the executive asked the government to employ artists to draw/paint in military areas & army camps for the purposes of record and na-

tional defence, and that artists be placed on committees for postwar reconstruction. Among Canada's war artists were at least 20 FCA members including one woman. Beginning in 1944, the Federation (and other organizations), compiled a significant Brief concerning the cultural aspects of Canadian postwar reconstruction.

#### 1945

In 1945, *The Province* wrote, "This is not just another art society... It is an organization formed to unite all the artists in Canada, whether member of existing societies or not, in a federation which it is hoped will become a power in the country..." Postwar, an official offshoot of the Federation, The Art In Living Group hosted exhibitions at various venues including the Vancouver Art Gallery and popular "Painting in the Parks" events in partnership with the Parks Board for young artists. The FCA organized a travelling exhibition in cooperation with UBC: Lawren Harris, Jack Shadbolt, Charles H Scott, Stanley Brunst and Cliff Robinson presented artwork through galleries in a dozen BC communities.

#### 1949

The FCA sponsored *Canadian Art*, the first national art periodical, called an "important vehicle for communication between artists, funders and collectors." FCA Maritime head and publisher Walter Abell moved to Ottawa and simply morphed his *Maritime Art* in *Canadian Art*, and joined the staff of the National Gallery of Canada (which continues to publish *Canadian Art* today as its own magazine). National Conferences were held every second year for the growing membership, providing knowledge and inspiration under the direction of visionaries André Biéler, Lawren Harris, Albert Gillson and Hunter Lewis. In 1949, the FCA made an instrumental presentation using the original Brief to create the Canada Arts Council to the Royal Commission on National Development in the Arts, Letters and Sciences: "the Massey Commission." This was a major instigator in the Council's 1957 launch.

#### 1950-1959

The success of the Canada Arts Council (which became Canada Council for the Arts in 1957, and today is a large federal Crown corporation) overshadowed the artist-sponsored Federation that began having serious financial difficulties and, despite gallant efforts by the national executive (including artists Hunter Lewis, Henry Glyde, Jack Shadbolt, Alison Palmer and Nancy Bakewell), interest from members waned. And Ontario, Saskatchewan and Alberta chapters disbanded.

#### 1960-1965

Although the Federation became BC-centric, it was reported to have 600 members in 1964, and hosted events including a Spring Exhibition featuring 80+ artists and a "Centennial Sculpture Exhibition" (Centennial year 1967) covering Queen Elizabeth Theatre's interior/exterior grounds. The Painting in the Parks youth program flourished (1952 = 92 registered participants; 1965 = 1,500 registrants) and was copied globally.

#### 1976-1977

Driven by dynamic new leader Allan W. Edwards, expansion began after two decades of slow growth. Edwards, international designer, artist & author, returned to Canada after years in Detroit, New York & California, and taught art in Victoria (to Pierre Berton, Sid Barron & Bill Reid, among others). The FCA re-launched traveling exhibitions in BC and Alberta, some going to Central Canada & USA. Chapters in Vancouver and Victoria then represented 400 members, with artists including Gordon Smith, Donald Jarvis, Raymond Chow, Ken Prescott, Harry Heine and Brian Johnson aiding in the FCA's rejuvenation. Vancouver and Calgary branches registered their groups under Provincial Non-Profit Societies Acts.

#### 1978-1989

The Federation opened the first artist-sponsored gallery in Canada to sell artwork by members in 1978, including classroom space, operating out of Allan's business office in Gastown. In the early 1980s, the FCA began organizing annual painting retreats on Salt Spring Island, BC, a very successful venture that drew artists from across Canada and USA. Celebrated artist members including Robert Genn, JAS McDonald, Robert Bateman, Alan

Wylie, Kiff Holland and Mike Svob actively provided kinship and guidance to many other artists. (NOTE: Genn met his Point Grev. Vancouver. neighbour Lawren Harris in 1961, instigating his FCA membership; Genn had problems painting skies and Harris' advice was to turn the picture upside-down.)

#### 1995-2000

A significant number of traveling and international exhibitions were organized through the Federation Gallery, international art exchanges, individual members, and through the very successful "AIM For Arts" show in 2000. The member publication Art Avenue was

launched. The gallery & offices were moved to their present location on Vancouver's Granville Island in 1996, a manufacturing area-turned artist's mecca that attracted arts organizations and a fine arts university.

#### 2002-2010

In 2002. the creatively inspired game-like "Paintings Ву Numbers" anfundraiser nual was launched, which successfully promoted FCA artists to a wider spectrum of art collectors in addition to raising funds. By 2010, chapters were located Calgary, AB and Comox, Victoria,

Nanaimo, Arrowsmith, Central Okanagan and North Okanagan, BC, with head office in Vancouver.

#### 2013

The current executive director, Patrick Meyer was hired to lead the organization, and began launching new growth initiatives: expanding the number of exhibitions within the Gallery to 24 per year & increasing educational programming with workshops, lectures and art critiques. A drive to launch new chapters has resulted in several new arts communities being represented. The contemporary look & functionality of the spacious Federation Gallery on Granville Island was updated, showcasing a roster of 50-100 artists each exhibition. Granville Is, a top tourist destination in Canada, attracts over 10 million visitors per year. This constant traffic has assisted in the Gallery's exponential growth in art sales.

#### 2016-2017

Federation membership grew by 700 members in three years and continued averaging two new members per day. Gallery artwork sales grew 168% due to hiring a gallery sales consultant. Online exhibitions increased with 4 open-call international exhibitions. The Federation's Plein Air Retreat was re-launched. And its Art Avenue publication was redesigned & began featuring magazine-style interviews with members including Robert Bateman & Roy Henry Vickers.

#### 2019-2021

The Federation now supports 2,800+ artists from all provinces, with 14 Chapters — introducing 5 chapters within the past 3 years. It boasts 44 exhibitions per year: 28 Gallery, 4 online-only & 12 chapter exhibitions. Online services expanded with workshops, critiques and introduction of www.federationacademy.ca to accommodate education programming. And www.federationgallery.ca became a useful adjunct to www.artists.ca for art sales. Chapters' exhibitions went online in 2020.



- 1. Although some artists laid low during 2020, Andrew McDermott, SFCA had a very busy year. His artworks received 10 awards including 2nd Prize (*Lights On Broadway*) in the 4th China Suzhou International Pastel Biennale; 2nd Place (*Lights On Broadway*) in PAC 8th Annual Members Online Juried Exhibition; "Pastel Society of Western NY Award" (*The Red Door*) in APS Adirondack National Pastel Exhibition; Honourable Mention (*What Color Next*) in MAPS 2020 International Exhibition Adventures in Pastel; "Pastel Society of New Mexico Award" (*Fiery Lights*) in PSWC's 34th Annual International Exhibition, and UART/"International Artist Sponsor Award" (*Creating Patterns*) in the PSSC Make Your Mark 2020 exhibition. Andrew's work was accepted into 21 local and international exhibitions in 2020.
- **2. Joyce Trygg** sold her second painting through the Artists for Conservation's annual international exhibition. The organization donates 50% of the selling price toward conservation projects, and Joyce's will support the David Sheldrick Wildlife Trust in Africa. This organization has rescued and reintegrated hundreds of orphaned baby elephants due to poachers killing their parents. Her two sales were *At Rest* (coyote) and *Lion around* (lion cub).
