






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EDITORIAL By Steven Laszcz



I will compile them and ask the jurors on your behalf and print the responses in a future issue. Please bear in mind that specific questions such as, "why did they bounce my forsythia picture?" can not be asked. What we are looking for here are questions that will help our readers better plan submissions to juried shows.

I'm also interested in hearing your "What If" ideas. Many times during the process of making our art we discover, quite by accident, a new combination of colours, or techniques that make our work really sparkle. We at the news want to share those little discoveries with our readers.

I would also like to welcome aboard Tony Greenall. Tony has volunteered to proofread the magazine before printing. It is not a huge job per se but is very time critical. Once the proof comes from the printer we have one day to make the corrections and send it back. Delays here will affect delivery of the Newsletter. Thanks also to everyone else who volunteered.

Finally, I would like to thank all of the people who have given me feedback, both positive and negative, while I learn the ropes. I appreciate your patience while I climb the learning curve. Thanks.

Until next month then, "What if" you go out and paint everyday.



GALLERY MANAGER'S REPORT By Nancy Clayton

For several weeks we have been trying to get enough time to think in a straight line about clarifying and streamlining some of the procedures involved in maneuvering artwork into, about, and out of the gallery. One case in point is slide labelling, logging and jurying.

Properly labelled slides will be accepted by the Slide Committee. This Committee is a small but ardent and committed group of members who volunteer to open all your entries, check the fees and log the slides – between 120 to 250 per juried show – on Gallery Control Sheets. Unlabelled slides will not be accepted. As all the gallery information (for the show list, the display labels and sales transactions) is garnered from the slide labels, it is most important that this labelling is correct and legible.

Once logged, all the slides are placed carefully in the projector carousel so that their order corresponds to the listing on the Gallery Control Sheets. For this to take place in time for the jury's smooth, orderly viewing and judging, there is usually only about 48 hours turnaround time, so we really appreciate your understanding that the due date for slide entries really cannot be adjusted, manipulated or blind-sided!

So, the Slide Committee really cares about the labelling.

Then comes the jury – 3 volunteer FCA's who care about the *quality* of your artwork and, therefore, the quality of the photographed image *may* affect the jury's judgment of your artwork. The goal is to have only the image of your painting projected in front of the jury and to have that image looking as much like your painting as is in any way possible. So...

 Take as large an image as possible of your artwork to fit inside the format of your 35-mm slide.

 If you decide to photograph your painting after matting and framing, no part of your mat or frame should show, place silver tape on the film over anything other than the artwork image.

 No tape, however, on the plastic or cardboard mounting, as it may cause your slide to stick inside (or outside) the projector (NOT good), and then the jury will not get to see it (*!!)...or the labelling-on-tape may peel or fall off...

 TIP: Photographing your "naked" painting (i.e. matless and frameless) against black velvet or felt may eliminate the need to use silver tape.

Once the jury has finished viewing all the entered slides (1 1/2 to 2 1/2 hours) and decided on "accepted" and "declined" entries, the Slide Committee comes back and within another 48 hours tries to get the results mailed back to you so you have ample time to get your "accepted's" fully prepared to hang in the Gallery 2 to 3 weeks hence. Please do not alter any pertinent information between the slide and the original painting. When you bring in your original painting, we have already typeset and printed the showlists and display labels, so details such as titles and prices cannot be changed. Before you leave your original painting in the Gallery, double check the Gallery Control Sheet and initial the appropriate box when

everything is correct.

Bruce Perry's oil portrait of Gerhardt received the most votes. His portrait of John received votes also. The second choice was Joyce Kamikura's acrylic Golden Lilies. Third choice was Dorothy Oxborough's pastel titled The Watcher II. Tinyan's oil painting Winter Approaching tied with Bruce Cryer's acrylic Duffy Lake for fourth choice.

Many visitors to the Successes exhibit were very enthusiastic and several mentioned how difficult it was to make only three choices from a gallery-full of choice. This is reflected in the wide inclusion of exhibitors in the People's Choices. Twenty-five of the 30 exhibitors received votes for one or all of their exhibited artwork.



NERRISA NG, AFCA

Nerrisa Ng began her education with the Chinese University where she earned certificates in Chinese painting. Several years later, after obtaining her BFA from the University of Victoria, she graduated from the Emily Carr College of Art and Design. It seems that both traditional Chinese painting and Western contemporary art have influenced Nerrisa's artwork. She creates canvasses "full of flowers," philosophical paintings like "Transformation," and very modern works like "Don't live in idleness, The serpent is watching." That is the definition of one contemporary artist: her work is a conglomerate of different influences, different cultures and different styles.

Ms. Ng is also a very active painter – a list of her group and solo exhibitions, and her awards, fills many pages. Born in Hong Kong and educated there as well as in Germany, the artist emigrated to Canada in 1987.

BRUCE PERRY, AFCA

The content of Bruce Perry's work as an artist has always been the human body, with the purpose of the work to see his world and who he is through a continuous process of looking at people and recording what he sees. A graduate of the Ontario College of Art, Bruce's professional background includes experience as a design architect, sculptor of bronze, and painter of the human face. His recent works are based on subjects he discovered in Vancouver's Downtown Eastside, representing a diversity of lifestyles. He uses both artistic and business techniques that leave him free of the issues of "painting portraits".

Bruce has been inspired by many artists, dead and alive, classic and modern, for their ability to reveal "who we are," which for him transcends other art issues of technique, style, politics, social and cultural context, and criticism. He says there is a universal and timeless continuity in the work of artists who focus on the human body and to that end his art continues that tradition. His painted people are obviously a function of their personal and social circumstances, unique and separate, but in the process of creation he sees himself in their faces. He intends to keep painting and exploring this new direction over the next few years and is currently working on figurative paintings at a larger scale while continuing to paint faces.

ORIGINAL PRINTS & REPRODUCTIONS

by Sam Black, FCA Professor Emeritus of Education, UBC

While it is encouraging to note the growing public interest in collecting prints, there is some confusion and considerable misunderstanding as to what constitutes an "original print." Lack of information and knowledge or, in some instances, misinformation has led to questionable sales and disillusioned buyers.

The concept of an original print is not easy to define; however, it is universally recognized that an original print is, at least, a work conceived by the artist as a print which involves the artist throughout the process of creation and production. Today, with the vast array of technically precise mechanical reproduction processes readily available, it is more than ever urgent that clear differentiations must be made between original prints and reproductions, in order to protect both artists and collectors alike.

To move towards an improvement in present practices and establish good standards, the *Professional Art Dealers' Ass'n*. of Canada has published recommendations to galleries, publishers, printers, print workshops, etc. Among these, is the following:

"Correct labelling is the prime necessity. No definition can ever achieve what correct labelling can do.

"A clear differentiation can be made between an original etching, lithograph, silk-screen, woodcut, original offset, etc. (conceived by the artist as a print) and a photo mechanical reproduction of a work originally conceived by the artist in another medium. Fuzzy or vague terminology such as, 'Litho Print,' 'fine art print,' etc. must be eliminated since these terms are misleading and cause great confusion in the print market. A reproduction must be labelled a reproduction. It is important, however, that the buying public know when a work is a reproduction, especially so in the case of a signed limited edition reproduction."

Other recommendations suggest labelling procedures for artists. It would be naive, as well as undesirable, to say there is no place for reproductions; but they need to be recognized for what they are and labelled and priced accordingly.

Only by scrupulous care and correct labelling can the artist's originality and integrity be maintained and collectors reassured that their print purchases are authentic and come from a truly original print limited edition.

REAL LIFE by Fred Cheesal

Anyone who has ever been in an art supply store knows that art does not come cheaply. After paying for paper, brushes, pigments and all the numerous necessities required to create your personal masterpiece, the words "starving artist" become more than a mere expression – but a way of life.

Fortunately, gone are my initial years of absolute hand-to-mouth existence, but as I glance around my studio, my retreat, I am aware of the costly inventory I have accumulated. I am also aware of where I keep this plethora of painting paraphernalia. I keep it in what I could find at the time.

My brushes are in a large glass Mason jar from our first house. My wife's pride still shines through the aging translucency. The scratched blue Lego containers holding my pigments remind me of all the happy hours spent on the floor helping build trucks and spaceships.

Most of my small "musts" are kept in a creaky old desk which can attest to my anguish as a child in preparing book reports for English class. Its warped top bears the initials of my first girlfriend, S.C., whoever she was. My tools are in the rusted chest given to me by my dad. He had kept it under lock and key on the farm, and I relive the wonderful anticipation of its contents whenever I open the lid.

The old shoe boxes and coffee cans bearing the names of companies long out of business, bent cardboard boxes held together with yellowed tape, an old wooden crate from a party so long ago that even the name Coca-Cola has almost disappeared, the useful cast-offs from caring friends and neighbours, they are all an irreplaceable part of my life.

In monetary value, this old junk is worthless compared to its contents, but I wouldn't replace it for a million dollars.
